EUCOM Commander-in-Chief Inspects Post Units And Installations Here

Mr. Murphy To Visit Military Government

Arriving in Augsburg yesterday by air, General Lucius D. Clay, EUCOM chief made an inspection of the units and installations here.

General Clay was met at the 5th Constabulary Airstrip by Major-General Milburn, 1st Military District Commander, Major General Roffe, Commanding Officer, U.S. Constabulary, Colonel Roffe, Commanding Officer, 2nd Brigade U.S. Constabulary, Colonel Tupper, Augsburg Military Post Commander, Colonel Elms, Regimental Commander of the 5th Constabulary Regiment, and Colonel Bond OMGUS.

General Clay was accompanied by Mr. Robert M. Murphy his Political Advisor who later conferred with OMG officials.

General Clay proceeded from the Airstrip to the Sheridan Kaserne where he witnessed a mass review of troops stationed in Augsburg and commented favorably on the appearance of the men.

Upon completion of the review General Clay started on a detailed inspection of the equipment, billets, recreational facilities and dependents accommodations of the Post.

General Clay first inspected the 74th Constabulary Squadron and the 5th Constabulary Regiment Headquarters.

Interrupting his inspection tour shortly after 1100 hours General Clay visited the Snack Bar at the Bavarian Cross Roads. He then proceeded to the Arras Kaserne, home of the 7815 S.C.U., and later inspected the Flak Kaserne.

At noon General Clay had luncheon with Colonel Bond, Commanding Officer of Co. "G", 3rd. Mil. Gov't. Regiment and a group of Military Government officers and local German officials.

Following the luncheon, the official party met a group of visitors from Kaufbeuren and continued the inspection of the Military Government offices. At 1405, the General took off from the airstrip. Before leaving, the Commander-in-Chief expressed his extreme gratification at the high standard attained by the men and officers stationed on the Augsburg Post.

New Arrival

Prince is C. O. of the 74th Constabulary Squadron.

World Famous Music At Salzburg Festival

A limited number of tickets will be available daily to persons wishing to attend the Salzburg festival and will be issued at the Berchtesgaden or Chiemsee rest centers upon request. However, there are no billeting facilities at Salzburg so arrangements should be made to stay at either Berchtesgaden or Chiemsee.

Eight concerts will be given by the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra with a number of famous directors and soloists participating. Edwin Fischer will conduct a Mozart program and also act as soloist; Vaclav Talich will conduct Czech music; Wilhelm Furtwaengler will conduct a program of classical music with Yehudi Menuhin as soloist; Charles Munch will direct French music; John Barbirolli, a program of Brahms, Delius and Haydn; Otto Klemperer, music by Gustav Mahler; Ernest Ansermet, music by Honnegger, Martin, and R. Strauss, and Hans Knappertsbusch will conduct a Beethoven and Schubert program.

Chamber concerts will include the Calvet quartet, Edwin Fischer trio, modern Austria composers and the Schneiderhan quartet. The Salzburg Mozarteum Orchestra, under the baton of Bernhard Baumgartner will present a orchestra serenade. The orchestra and the Salzburg Dom Choir all under the direction of Joseph Messner will give

New Sunday School To Open

Its Sunday school time for the children of Augsburg this Sunday. Under the sponsorship of Chaplain Lovell Matheny the new Sunday school will begin at the Community School house (Stiefelen Straße No. 1) at 1100 hours, July 20. There will be four classes: the beginners for those under three years, the primary for the preschoolers; the juniors and the intermediates. Literature for the beginners or cradle roll group has not yet arrived; but there is an ample supply of excellent Baptist children's literature available for the other three groups. Buchenwald Defendant Denies All Charges

Dachau. — A crowded courtroom, filled mainly by women, greeted Ise Koch, the so-called "Bitch of Buchenwald", when she took the stand in her own behalf.

Clad in a loose-fitting outfit consisting of a blue checkered dress, brown coat and polished shoes, she presented an attitude of calm as she stood before the court and raised her right hand to swear in the trial that finds 39 other defendants being tried for their lives for violations of the law and usages of war in connection with the operation of the infamous Buchenwald concentration camp.

The courtroom was almost deathly silent when she walked from the witness chair to a chart to point out the place where she rode horseback while her husband, Carl Koch, was camp commandant.

Visibly pregnant, Frau Koch, steadfastly denied charges against her that she initiated a fad to have lamp shades, gloves and book bindings made

from tattooed skins of former inmates at Buchenwald.

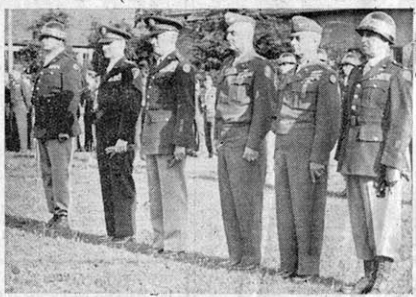
Captain Emanuel Lewis, a member of the counsel defending the woman, directed pointed questions at Frau Koch in the opening minutes of her stay on the stand.

William D. Denson, chief prosecutor for the government, showed the auburn-haired witness a shrunken head and attempted to have her say that it was in her husband's office while he was commandant at the camp. This the woman denied ever having seen before this trial.

She seemed unperturbed as Denson shot question after question at her in an attempt to tear down her story, which showed her as the usual housewife devoted to her children.

After admitting that she had lived at Buchenwald for approximately six years, she denied knowing anything about brutalities perpetrated there and denied even knowing that many buildings even existed, although

Trooper of the Week

T/Sgt. William A. Craig was chosen 'Trooper of the week' for his outstanding work as platoon Sgt. of the second platoon of "D" Troop 74th Con. Sq.

He is, in every sense of the word, a veteran, having eleven years service, three being overseas. Sgt. Craig's first hop was to Greenland in June 1941. He also saw service in Iceland before going to England in August 1942. He landed at Casablanca 8 Nov. 1942 and went through the entire North Africa campaign. After a brief "rest," the journey started once more and took him to Sicily, Italy and Anzio.

After 15 days rotation leave in August 1943, Sgt. Craig took Air Corps pilot training and accumulated 75 hours flying time. In April 1944, he once more headed across the pond, this time to the Pacific. After a brief training period in



Hawaii, he landed at Saipan on 12 plus 2 and stayed to the end of that campaign. More training followed on Saipan, and in February he landed the two Jimas part of the famous Task Force 58. He did not stay to the end of that battle, for after 27 days of intense action, he was evacuated to Saipan for his wounds. Being tougher than his wounds, however, Sgt. Craig was soon in action, this time at Okinawa. VJ found him in Tokyo, and after sweating out redeployment tie-ups like millions of others, he returned to the United States for resettlement. Arriving in the EC for the second time, he was assigned to the 474th AB in March 1946.

Holder of the Air Medal, the Purple Heart with oak leaf cluster, and eight battle stars among other decorations, T/Sgt. William A. Craig is a soldier the Army can well be proud of, and one that "D" Troop is proud to announce as its TROOPER OF THE WEEK.

they were located within a stone's throw of her home, according to the prosecution. The term "Bitch of Buchenwald" and the word "commandeuse", were also introduced in court by the defense but Frau Koch said she knew of no German word that would match either. The defendant said she had heard the expressions for the first time from reading the newspapers.

Denson abruptly ended his questioning after the woman had repeatedly denied any knowledge of his allegations. The trial, now in its third month, attracted world-wide attention because of the internationally known persons who were among the 250,000 prisoners held there and because of the background of the defendants, among them the former Prince Waldeck, the first German, of royal blood to be tried as a war criminal.

Notes on books in the Augsburg Military Post Libraries by Mariana Thurber Post Librarian

This is holiday time for everybody. If it's at all possible, off we go to Garmisch or Berchtesgaden, Paris, Prague, Copenhagen, London, and all the other fascinating spots that we have the unusual opportunity of visiting very easily and cheaply.

It's true that when the sun is shining and travel is in the blood, reading is not number one on your entertainment list. But there are a lot of ways your Special Services libraries can help you have a good trip. How will you decide where to go? You'll find that reading more about a place you've always heard about will help make up your mind. It will make a lot of difference, too, after you get there. For example, reading about the tragically insane life of Ludwig II, the mad king of Bavaria, will make visits to his castles at Oberammergau, Fussen, Chiemsee, etc., all the more interesting. Clara E. Laughlin tells you all about it in her "So You're Going to Germany and Austria". Here is another who knows traveling is one of life's good experiences, and enthusiastically guides you to the places you shouldn't miss. Besides the book on Germany and Austria, there are other Laughlin books: "So You're Going to Paris"; "So You're Going to France"; "So You're Going to England". For straight history, there are "Germany", a Short History by Schuster and "France", a Short History by Guardar.

Other books for background reading before and after you travel are "The Land of France" by Dutton, "Mrs. England Goes on Living" by Valentin; "France Will Live Again" by Chamberlain; "Facts A-Z by Blackwood"; "The German People" by Denmark, an official Danish publication. And there are always the atlases for visualizing just where you're going and where you've been.

No matter where you go in your travels there will be times when you'll want to do a little reading — perhaps on the train and in occasional leisure moments. For these, take along a paper-bound book or two. You will find a large supply of them in all of the libraries and they are yours for the taking.

Bavarian Customs

Religion plays a major role in the lives of most Bavarians and they are reflected in many of their customs.

Perhaps one of the sweetest and most beautiful of all these customs is that of the Communion Candles. Many is the time you will see little girls dressed in white, bearing in their hands large white candles as they walk towards the church. They are on their way to their first communion. The candle that they carry is usually about 24 inches tall and 2 to 3 inches thick. It is made of refined beeswax and often bears upon its surface a religious design in silver or gold. They are lit at the time of the first communion and then not again until the hour of the owners death.

You have perhaps noted the mosque-like domes that adorn so many of the Bavarian churches. But did you know that these picturesque domes are reflections of the Moorish architecture which infiltrated into southern Europe during the middle ages?

Bavarian holidays are in the main religious holidays and a outstanding feature of every religious holiday are the many-colored streamers that fly from poles and windows etc. Every one of the colors, which so brilliantly fly overhead has a religious meaning a few of which I will list below. Perhaps next time they will mean a little more to you.

- Black — Symbol of Death
- White — for the Virgin
- Blue — caring in going to pray for intercession
- Red — most important; symbol of martyrs

It would be hard to find a simpler recipe for jam than this one given by Better Homes and Gardens.

Strawberry Jam

Wash and hull berries. Measure. Allow 3 cups of sugar for each quart. Mash fruit as it heats, bring it to a boil. Add sugar and boil until thick—not over 20 minutes. Pour into jars. Seal.

This dessert is delicious to eat and refreshing and pretty to see. Perfect for a hot day.

Strawberry Fluff

Ingredients:

- 3 eggs
- 1 pint strawberries
- 1/2 cup and 3 Tablesp granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup confectioner's sugar
- 1 teasp vanilla
- 2 cups milk

Beat 2 egg yolks and whole egg with 1/4 cup granulated sugar. Pour 2 cups scalded milk slowly over this mixture. Cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Cool and add 1 teasp vanilla. Crush strawberries and sweeten with confectioner's sugar. Beat 2 egg whites until stiff adding gradually 3 Tablesp granulated sugar. Chill custard, berries and meringue separately. Assemble in sherbet glasses. Serves 6.

Rhubarb Pudding

Ingredients:

- 2 cups rhubarb
- 2 cups bread crumbs
- 1 Tablesp grated lemon rind
- 1/2 Tablesp lemon juice
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 10 Tablesp sugar

Combine diced rhubarb, sugar, bread crumbs, lemon rind, and juice. Beat together milk and egg; add to rhubarb mixture. Place into a buttered baking dish. Top with pieces of butter. Bake in moderate oven (375°) for 1 hour. Serves 6.

PX Pete Gives Perfume Answers

1. Question: How do the prices in perfumes over here compare with Stateside prices. For instance, Vell, Caron, Chanel, Schiaparelli, Piquet, Worth or Lancome?

Answer: The prices in the States vary between 2 and 4 times the prices paid here. I will give you a few examples within the brands you have mentioned.

Vell costs \$ 8.00 per 2-ozs. in our stores; while in the US it costs \$ 35.00.

Caron "Fleurs de Rocaille" costs \$ 7.00 for 2-ozs. here and in the US \$ 45.00.

Chanel "No. 5," we sell for \$ 4.00. US price is \$ 32.50.

Schiaparelli costs \$ 150.00 for 4-ozs. while we sell it at \$ 4.00 and \$ 4.00 for 1-ozs.

Piquet "Brigand" we sell it at \$ 11.00. Stateside price is \$ 52.00 for the same 2-ozs. bottle.

These prices have been featured in popular women's magazines.

(a) I have seen two bottles of perfume of the same size in different prices, one \$ 8.00, and the other \$ 3.00. Why is this?

Answer: Yes, that in Lancome "Petit Elixir." The \$ 5.00 bottle is a finer and more decorative. I have experience of this myself. I knocked the \$ 2.00 bottle which is thin glass against a marble slab and broke it.

2. Question: What is it that makes a good perfume?

Answer: Perfume is composed of three things:

1. Scent oil
2. Alcohol
3. A fixing agent

Scent oil is obtained from flowers, spices, fruits, etc. The character of perfume depends primarily on this oil.

The equalizing agent is alcohol distilled from grapes. The fixing agent may be animal or vegetable, example, ambergris or musk, pine needles or moss. It may also be synthetic. Synthetic fixing agents are used when there is a shortage of animal or vegetables fixatives.

Milk And Bread At Sub-Stations

The Augsburg Military Post G.Y.A. softball team continued undefeated in the Southern League by defeating Garmisch 2-1 last Thursday.

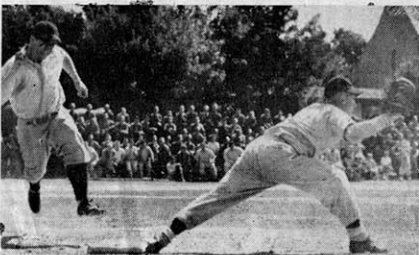

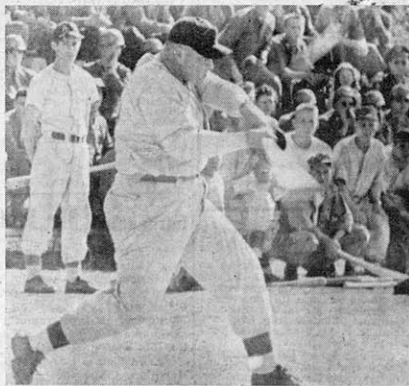

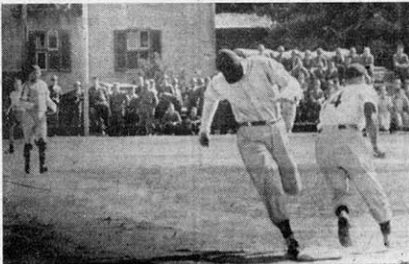

Czech Tour

The following memorandum issued by the Office of the Military Attaché, Prague, Czechoslovakia, is quoted for your information: "Herewith are few important elements of information that will tend to make a success of your visit to Czechoslovakia. Czechoslovakia participated in World War II as an ally of the United States Government. In normal peace times, foreign nationals visiting Czechoslovakia are not permitted to wear their military uniforms; however, this regulation presently has been waived by the Czechoslovakian Government and therefore, US military personnel may wear their uniforms when visiting Czechoslovakia.

Normally anything you bring into Czechoslovakia is subject to customs duty. You are authorized to import sixty (60) cigarettes for your own use. If you wish to import a private car, you may import it on a tripartite or carnet. You may sell your own car in Czechoslovakia. If you want to export any article from Czechoslovakia, it is subject to customs duty and to an export license of the Ministry of Export Trade unless its value is less than 3,000 Czech crowns. One US dollar is equal to fifty Czechoslovak crowns. You may import any amount of dollar-

backed instruments or travelers checks, but you are required to report the amount to the customs officials on the border, and the amount being exported from the country after your visit must not be greater than the amount originally imported. You may export 500 crowns in Czech currency, but not more. Whatever you do, do not try to avoid the customs, as you can be seized for anything which has not been reported is liable to confiscation.

You may obtain food tickets at your hotel or from the local food office. You may also obtain gasoline tickets from the Czechoslovakian Ministry of Transport in Prague. If you are the owner of a car, be extremely careful in your actions and conversations concerning existing Czechoslovakian political parties and clubs. PARCELS EXEMPT FROM DUTY TO THE UNITED STATES

1. Pending decision of Treasury and Post Office Department custom declaration tags are not necessary on gift parcels from military personnel the value of which is less than \$50.00.
2. It is suggested that the following indorsement be placed on gift parcels in this category in order to take advantage of duty free entry until such a time as

a definite decision is received at this Headquarters:

1. This parcel contains a Bonus Fide Gift from the sender, a member of the US Armed Forces, to the addressee the value of which is not in excess of \$50.00 and which, under Public Law, is entitled to duty free entry.
2. This indorsement must be signed and the rank, serial number together with organization shown below signature.

Introducing Mr. R. C. McLain Field Director

Mr. McLain has been in Augsburg some eighteen months, which certainly makes him one of the oldest American residents. We found the interview so fascinating that we regret that space permits only a glimpse into his life's history. Mr. McLain's home town is Massillon, Ohio, the city made famous for Football by Coach Paul Brown. However, Mr. McLain's travels have by no means been confined to Massillon.

His military career has absorbed the greater portion of Mr. McLain's time. His start in the field was, we think, very unique. He joined an Episcopal Church Choir in Massillon at a tender age. Two years later he was sent for the good of discipline to a Catholic Boys Military School in Cleveland, Ohio. After six months he ran away to be a Cowboy in the West. For some years he "Soldiered" in every sense of the word. He was finally formally adopted by the Blackfeet Indian Tribe, becoming very proficient in the Blackfeet Indian War Dance.

Came the first World War to interrupt his Indian Dance. He went to Medicine Hat, Alberta, and fell in with some enlisted soldiers. One night at a party they dressed Mr. McLain in a Catholic Boys Military School representing the Canadian 31st Overseas Mounted Rifles. He was so intrigued by the results of this picture, that he almost joined these men right then and there. But now he is very happy that he waited till the next Day's sober, cold daylight. This enabled him to join the American Army, and help it win the war. He was sent to the Pacific with the 3rd U.S. Engineers. He finished as a 1st Lt. in the 21st U.S. Infantry — the President's Own.

Having served gallantly overseas and fought most of his battles on the beach of Waikiki, Mr. McLain returned to the U. S. to lick his wounds — and await the World's next great conflagration.

It came all too soon. The outbreak of World War II found Mr. McLain purchasing a toupee, ly-



ing about his age, and offering his services to his country as a pilot in the Army Air Forces ... the latter, however, countered with the flat statement that a young man in his second childhood was not what they were looking for. Still licking his wounds, he did find himself over seas again. This time in England and with the Air Force. But in the humble capacity of a Red Cross Director. Personally, we have heard some very fine reports on his work as a Field Director.

In England he was attached to the 364th Fighter Sqdn. ... the 2nd Photo Reconnaissance ... Following VJ day, he was assigned to the 9th Division Hq. at Wasserburg, Germany. When the Division moved to Augsburg in February of '46, Mr. McLain came with it and has been here ever since.
